Autumn and Advent evenings

This time of year can be a busy time for Christians as we offer gifts for harvest and remember especially those around our country and our world who are in need, and as we move into a time of remembrance beginning on All Saints Sunday.

In November, as we move into the season of Advent and begin to look towards the beginnings of our Christian story once again, we will be spending Wednesday evenings exploring one of the Pilgrim courses.

The Pilgrim courses are a new series of booklets which explore Christian faith in a modern way by approaching the great issues of faith by participation in a pattern of contemplation and discussion. The Subject:

'ROBOTS AND ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE'.

The evening will be led by Canon Albert Radcliffe and Mr Scott Midson, a PhD student who has recently completed his thesis on the subject of Robots. Robots and the algorithms that make them possible have been very much in the news this year. They are currently exploring Mars, assisting with operations and caring for the elderly, while a United Nations consultation at Geneva on the use of military robots [killerbots] was unable to arrive at any clear conclusions. Robots, or automated systems that apply the latest developments in Artificial Intelligence [AI] are increasingly doing what previously only human beings could do, like driving cars. Are there limits to their ability to render us obsolete? What religious questions do robots raise? Is Prof. Stephen Hawking right to warn us of their growing influence? These are just some of the questions the evening will tackle. There will be time for discussion and questions.

Saint of the Month. 1st October. Remigius [Remi], Bishop of Rheims, [c. 437- 533 AD. Apostle of the Franks.

hristian nations give special honour to those who first brought them the gospel, and France which is well off for patron saints has St Remi, together with St Denys, Martin of Tours, Joan of Arc and Therese of Lisieux.

Remi was high born, saintly and immensely able and though still a layman was elected Bishop of Rheims when he was only 22. He was also well-placed for access to the royal court where the Queen, Clotilde, wife of Clovis, king of the Franks, was a Christian.

Remi's ministry at court and friendship with Clovis bore fruit when in 496, the king asked to baptised. His motives were probably a mixture of the spiritual and the pragmatic. As a Christian he would have the support of the papacy and through its vast network of educated clergy a ready made civil service. And besides this he probably attributed his recent victory over the Alamanni, a powerful pagan German confederation of tribes, to God answering the prayers of Remi. 3,000 Franks were said to have been baptised with their king and the royal family, though, as insurance for their future as warriors, many it's said kept their sword arm out of the water. There's a sermon illustration in that somewhere!

This was a time when many people automatically took the religion of their prince and a personal faith might follow in due course. Remi was now in a position to build churches and establish dioceses like those at Tournai and Cambrai to build on what he'd begun. Such was his own example of the Christian faith that a number of those he appointed as bishops, like Vedast of Therouanne, were later canonised as saints. It was this Vedast who with Remi had been involved in the conversion of Clovis.

The reputation of Remi was such that in England six churches were dedicated to him. In Christian art the symbols of St Remi are a dove, this was because of the story that the chrism for Clovis' baptism was miraculously provided by a dove, a book, and a lamp.

You Never Know Who You Might Meet On Holiday!

In August, Trena and I booked into a tucked away Yorkshire hotel that pampers the retired: Nidd Hall, just north of what's said to be the happiest place in England: Harrogate. Nidd! The name comes from the Celtic word 'Nith', which means 'Shining River.' So what's a Welsh word doing in Yorkshire? And that's where, for a history Nerd, our holiday gets really interesting!

In Roman times, the ancient Britons of what's now Yorkshire were a Celtic tribe called the Brigantes who spoke a variety of Welsh. When the Romans left Britain in 410 AD, the Brigantes became a kingdom called Elmet which lasted until the year 616AD when the Anglians, from which we get our word 'English', of Northumbria invaded and took over.

And now St Chad [c634 - 672] comes into the story because in 664 AD the King, Oswiu, made Chad bishop of Northumbria and Chad, as we know from our first historian, the Venerable Bede, was a great traveller and preacher.

In the churchyard, less than a 100 yards from the hotel, were the remains of an ancient stone cross, which would have marked a Christian site and preaching point. Did St Chad preach there? As he travelled around his vast diocese, the odds are that he must have done because not long after his death an important Church Synod was held at the river Nidd and the cross would have marked the spot where it took place.

Like 'Nidd', 'Chad' is also a Celtic or Welsh name, indicating that though he was an Anglian Northumbrian Chad's name went back to the Celtic Kingdom of Elmet, as did his version of the Christian faith. Chad followed the customs of the northern Celtic church and not those of the southern Roman. The tensions and rivalries between the two traditions were were eventually sorted out at the Synod of Whitby in 664AD, when Roman customs were declared the norm. It was moving to stand by the remains of the ancient cross at Nidd where almost certainly St Chad himself had once stood. You never know who you might meet on holiday.

And then, in 874, the the Danes settled in the area, just as they did around Manchester. Yarmer, a Danish word meaning 'ditch' is a place name near the church. Nidd was a quiet place after that, until in 1320, peace was disturbed by the Scots, celebrating their victory at Bannockburn [1314] pillaged Nidd and destroyed its church. The church was rebuilt the same year and again in 1866. This was the church Trena and I visited. It was like stepping back into the recent past! On the lectern was a copy of the King James Bible still used at services as is the 1662 prayer book.

As canon law once required, the royal coat of arms was on display, as was a nicely lettered board with the Lord's Prayer, the Creed and the Ten Commandments from which even children of my generation would learn them by heart as part of their preparation for confirmation! It took one back! The parish of Nidd still has a priest-in-charge, though today he's a retired clergyman.

'Always go to church on holiday,' I used to tell my congregation. 'You'll be surprised what you'll find and it'll be an education.'
